hen my family first came to America from Tonga, we had very little,"Ms. Faiva-Siale said. "We lived with Emily's family, and they cared for us and made their home our home. When I travel to see her, I may take a handmade blanket, we go out to eat and we spend time talking about family," said Ms. Faiva-Siale, an administrative assistant with the Euless Police Department.

Faiva-Siale said that it was not uncommon for people in the Euless Tongan community to journey to their place of birth to attend funerals, weddings and other special occasions. Some might travel as many as three times each year or more, said Ms. Faiva-Siale whose family relocated to Euless in 1985.







he space program was very important work," said Mr. Tonga, who lives in Euless with his wife, Lynn, an American Airlines retiree. "I worked with and came to know the seven astronauts who were killed in the Columbia Space Shuttle accident," he said softly. "I was in Houston at NASA with my colleagues watching when it happened. It was one of the saddest days of my life."

fter working in the space industry in Houston, Italy and Germany, Mr. Tonga, now semi-retired, made Euless his home in 1992. He became the first chairman of the Euless Tongan Community Committee, and helped to establish programs designed to improve the lives of young students, and their hardworking parents.

A graduate of Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, Mr. Tonga, who studied engineering, spent four years in the United States Air Force after earning his college degree. He then went to work for The Boeing Company, the world's leading designer and manufacturer of commercial aircraft.

worked in Seattle and in Los Angeles," said Mr. Tonga, the father of two daughters and two sons. "I participated in the launch of the very first space shuttle in 1981," he added. The program that Mr. Tonga worked on was the first of hundreds of NASA missions into space. The work that he and his colleagues performed elevated the spirit of an entire nation.

have always wanted to help people," said Mr. Tonga, whose father, Semisi, was a barber while his mother, Lea, made clothing for a living. "In my youth I always wanted to build things," he said. 
